I would like to start by saying how incredibly thankful I am to you, our community for all your support for our Hospice during my time as Chief Executive. It's been a challenging few years with Covid hitting and impacting our clinical services and reducing our income streams. However, 2022 was such a fantastic year, and a great one for me to sadly end my time at Dr Kershaw's on.

I am so proud of our new In-Patient Unit and our nursing and medical teams, the service provided to our patients is wonderful and the environment they are now cared in is everything I ever wished for, for our Hospice. Our Community Team has evolved as a result of Covid, as at one point our Hospice doors were closed and our full Nursing Team were relocated to the community, caring for people in their own homes. This has shown us even more how vital that service is, giving people the chance to be cared for and to die at home surrounded by their loved ones. After being closed for so long during the pandemic, our Well-Being Centre has recently relaunched and we have an exciting, varied offer to suit clients, carers, the bereaved and many more individuals.

2022 also brought the return of our events and I am so thankful to each and every one of you who has supported each of our events and our campaigns, which have enabled us to bring in vital funds for the Hospice, something that stopped for so long during the pandemic.

2023 will see us reducing our Heart of the Hospice newsletter from four to two issues a year. With the current cost of living crisis and our financial deficit this change will enable us to save vital costs on printing moving forward, as well as aligning with our revised Lottery Bumper Draws. We will still be keeping you informed on all the latest Hospice news in each issue. For more information please see page 19.

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Farewell to Joanne

Joanne Sloan began her nurse training in 1980, working her way up through the nursing ranks, she has served the people of Oldham for over 40 years. She joined the Hospice in December 2014 as Director of Clinical Services, before being promoted to Chief Executive in March 2018. During Joanne's time at Dr Kershaw's, she has been instrumental in the introduction of new services at the Hospice including the launch of our Community Services – Hospice at Home and Caring Hands, providing the people of Oldham with the choice of being cared for at the end of their lives in their own homes. Joanne has also seen the transformation of the Hospice from the old facility to our incredible new In-Patient Unit. Below are just some of the highlights from Joanne's career at our Hospice...

Purple Tattoos for Family in Tribute of Their Dad and Our Caring Hands Team

After Frank Pullen, 81, was diagnosed with Cancer of the Oesophagus, daughter, Sue Collinge, and her mum, Judy, cared for him at home each day without any external help, as Frank had brought up the family to always support themselves. After Frank was informed that there was nothing else the hospital could do to treat his cancer, the family were told about the Hospice's Caring Hands Team, whom from their arrival changed everything for the family, enabling Sue and Judy to go back to being Frank's daughter and wife, instead of his carers. After Frank sadly died on 14th July 2021, Sue and her family got together and in tribute to the dad and husband they had lost, and the incredible care received by our Caring Hands Team (who leave a purple heart with each patient after they have passed away as well as one with their loved ones) they each made the decision to have poignant purple heart tattoos...

"Dad was married to my mum, Judy and had two children- myself and my brother David, along with four grandsons- Peter, Michael, Stephen and Ben and a great granddaughter, Thea Poppy.

Mum and dad had been together for an incredible 63 years, after meeting at Hughes & Bolton where dad worked as a Car Mechanic and mum worked in the office. Dad then went to work at the Shell Garage on Huddersfield Road before opening the Lees Village Service Station in 1992. Dad loved our garage and was still determined to pop in regularly even when he was poorly, the customers all loved him. Dad had three loves – the garage, playing golf at Saddleworth Golf Club, and his family... in that order 😊. He passed his love of golf onto his sons and grandsons and played regularly at the golf club. He loved us all going out as a family and we always went out each New Year's Eve.

Dad was a fun person who never fell out with anyone, he was in relatively good health until he was 78, when he received his cancer diagnosis, previously only being in hospital once before when he was very young to have his tonsils removed. In April 2021, we received the devastating news that there was nothing else that could be done for dad, and this was unfortunately followed by dad having a fall, which resulted in a broken hip. Dad was admitted to hospital initially but we all wanted him back home with us. On 23rd June 2021, we were introduced to the amazing Caring Hands Team, and when they arrived everything changed. Before then we had cared for dad ourselves, not wanting to put on anyone else. The difference they made to our family was immense, as soon as they arrived the mood in our home lifted. I was told to "go

back to being Frank's daughter" and mum "to go back to being Frank's wife." Words I will never forget and that meant so much.

The love and care dad received from Caring Hands was unbelievable, nothing was ever too much trouble for the team. They truly are angels. The Caring Hands Team upon realising dad's breathing had changed and that his passing was imminent arranged for the Hospice at Home team to come, who ensured that dad was comfortable and that we could all have some personal time with him. After dad passed away, the Hospice at Home team changed dad and his bedding, all the time talking to him, which really did touch us so very much.



Caring Hands gave one purple knitted heart to dad which went in his coffin and one to mum, which mum now holds when she is missing him for comfort. After the amazing care from the Caring Hands Team and also the love and respect shown to dad from the Hospice at Home Team, after dad passed, as a family we decided we all wanted our own purple hearts, and each got a small purple tattoo. The irony being dad didn't like tattoos, we all have had our own interpretation but each is part of the tribute too.

Dad passed away shortly before his Diamond Wedding Anniversary but had already arranged that 60 white roses were to be sent to mum on that day, as he had done each year on their anniversary. Since dad died we have raised and donated a total of £7,335 for the Hospice who supported us so much, by asking for donations at his funeral, selling some of dad's possessions and raising funds in the garage. No amount of money could ever cover the appreciation we feel for the team at Dr Kershaw's who did so much for our family."

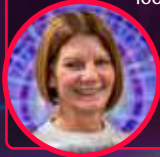

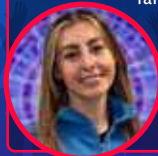

60 Seconds with... Hospice Counsellor, Lisa Hctor



Lisa began her journey with Dr Kershaw's as a Volunteer Counsellor acting as a support for staff across the Hospice, in August 2022 she was appointed in the position of Hospice Counsellor, a role which now enables her to provide vital support for patients and their families when they need it the most...

Why did you apply to work at Dr Kershaw's?

I applied for the role of Counsellor, as it's a really special role, one of a kind. It combines counselling with my background in the creative arts, enabling me to support patients, their families and the Hospice community.

Where did you work before Dr Kershaw's?

I worked as a Children's Therapist in primary schools across Oldham and as a Counsellor at an alcohol recovery organisation supporting adults in their recovery of alcohol addiction. I also volunteered at a bereavement counselling service in Oldham. Before becoming a Therapist I was a classically trained Actor touring in theatre, and I then went on to establish a theatre company that uses the creative and expressive arts in a positive way to enhance people's mental health and well-being. I find it very meaningful supporting people, showing them care, respect and dignity at a time when they need support to navigate the challenges of life.

Give us an overview of your role?

I work one-to-one counselling clients as well as making daily visits to patients in

our In-Patient Unit, supporting them in a holistic way and developing a relationship with their loved ones. I also facilitate the men's group and bereavement group as well as the Nightbird Project, a really exciting new creative project which supports patients living with life-limiting illnesses to tell their stories in creative ways.

What are the rewards of your role?

I find every single day in work to be a rewarding and enjoyable experience, it's extremely gratifying to support a client through a counselling process and to see their growth and positive changes. It is also a privilege to spend time with patients and their families on the In-Patient Unit, and hear about their lives, their memories and their stories.

What is your favourite thing about working at the Hospice?

The people and the quality of care! I find it so moving to observe the way the nurses care for patients and feel very proud to be working at such an innovative organisation within the health sector.

Light Up a Life

Each year, our Light Up a Life service gives people the opportunity to remember their loved ones during the festive season and to celebrate the lives of those who are no longer with us, but are always in our thoughts, whether they received care from the Hospice or not. This year, we were able to once again run our Light Up a Life in-person service at the Hospice, as well as live streaming the service for the third year running so people could watch in the comfort of their own homes...

We were overwhelmed by the support for our services which took place on Sunday 4th December with over 2,300 households tuning in to the virtual service. Over 1,150 dedications were made to loved ones, and hundreds of people attended our in-person service, with our Light Up a Life appeal raising just under £24,500 to support our patients and their loved ones. Those who made a dedication had a light lit in memory of their loved ones on our dedication tree and their loved ones names had a special place in our Light Up a Life Book of Remembrance as well as on-screen during our virtual service.

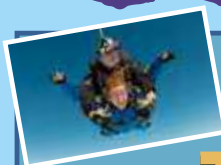

We are So Very Grateful for the Love and Support Given to Linda

Linda Dixon was just 66 when she passed away, after being diagnosed with a rare sarcoma at the back of her liver. After her diagnosis, Linda's condition deteriorated and in June 2021, she started to receive care from our Caring Hands Team and later our Hospice at Home Team before being admitted to the In-Patient Unit where she sadly died on 7th August 2021. Upon her diagnosis, her partner, Richard Sweeney and her sons struggled to care for Linda themselves at home, and were so very grateful when Linda started to receive care from Dr Kershaw's Hospice, that after she died, Richard made a donation in her memory to enable the Hospice to care for and support more patients and families...

"Linda was a lovely lady, loved by absolutely everyone she met. Linda was married to Graham for 30 years before he died in 2008, and they had two sons together, Robert and Peter and a grandson, William.

Linda and I had been together for five years. Linda loved her holidays and eating out and as a couple we enjoyed a lot of both! One of my favourite memories is of Linda enjoying her pudding at Rick Stein's restaurant in Padstow. Linda also loved her garden, and spent many hours in it, she was always her happiest outside in the garden.

Linda was born in Chadderton and trained as a nurse at Royal Oldham Hospital before qualifying as a midwife. Later in her career, Linda became a practice nurse at surgeries in Oldham as well as Royton.

In 2017, we received the devastating diagnosis that Linda had a rare sarcoma at the back of her liver. She had an operation and was fine for over a year, but then later scans confirmed that there was nothing more that the doctors could do to treat her. Linda remained fit and well in herself until the beginning of 2020 and was still taking the dog for a walk a couple of times a day when the pandemic started.

I was looking after Linda along with her sons, but as her health started to deteriorate we needed professional help to support us. The community palliative care nurses told us about Dr Kershaw's Caring Hands Team and we arranged for them to start coming to care for Linda each day. They helped such a lot, I wouldn't have managed without their support. Initially they came twice a day, each morning and evening but as she got more poorly they came in four times a day, getting her up each day, putting her to bed and changing her when needed. Their support for the month they came to our home was unbelievable. Linda felt very supported and at the end as she got

weaker she felt comfortable and at ease with being admitted to the Hospice's In-Patient Unit.

The In-Patient Unit itself is a lovely facility, the nurses there couldn't do enough for Linda, they arranged for her to have reflexology on her feet and aromatherapy, anything she wanted they'd do. They really helped us too and were very supportive, keeping us up to date with Linda's medication, letting us know what was happening and keeping her as comfortable as possible. We could visit as and when we wanted. At that point, Linda was asleep a lot but we could sit with her and the staff would just come in and chat to us.

On the day Linda died, we got a phone call early in the morning, and she died within half hour of us getting to the Hospice. Dr Kershaw's Team were wonderful with everything and cared for us afterwards.

Linda was in the Hospice for 12 days before we sadly lost her on 7th August, she was just 66. We can't thank the staff at the Hospice and the Community Team enough, they were all very caring and did everything to make Linda comfortable, as well as supporting myself and her sons, showing us much love.

After Linda died I wanted to do something to show my appreciation to the Hospice, and so I made a donation in Linda's memory, to support future patients and families as we were supported so very much."
